## The College of Benefactors

### Honouring Tony Leandro and the Oakwell Trust

For more than a decade, the University has recognised the transformative generosity of its most significant supporters through the College of Benefactors, the highest honour it can bestow on donors. At the 2025 Summer Graduation, we were proud to induct Tony Leandro and his charitable foundation, the Oakwell Trust, into this select group.

Tony graduated from Reading in 1972 with a degree in Mathematics, spending much of his social time in his first two years at St. David's Hall and living in Windsor Hall during his final year. He recalls that his time at Reading was "a truly transformative experience... it gave me many opportunities that shaped my future. I cherish the lifetime friendships that started there."

The foundation Tony built at Reading supported a distinguished career as an actuary. In 1989, Tony co-founded Barnett Waddingham LLP, now one of the UK's leading consultancy firms, before retiring in 2011. Upon retirement, Tony and his sons established the Oakwell Trust, dedicated to supporting educational initiatives with a clear mission: to help those who want to help others.

The Trust has found a powerful partner in the University's Participatory Integrated Climate Services for Agriculture (PICSA)

programme. PICSA equips small-scale farmers in the Global South with practical climate information and decision-making tools, helping them navigate risks and opportunities brought by climate change. By directly empowering farmers, the programme has enabled communities to improve livelihoods, raise incomes, and strengthen food security.

To date, PICSA has reached more than a million households in 30 countries and built capacity within national agricultural and meteorological organisations, ensuring local ownership and sustainability. The Oakwell Trust's support has been pivotal in driving this progress, enabling PICSA not only to expand its reach but also to strengthen resilience and create lasting change in farming communities worldwide.

Dr Graham Clarkson, Senior Research Fellow and PICSA Manager, explained: "Tony and the Oakwell Trust have been one of PICSA's biggest supporters and have contributed to transforming the lives of hundreds of thousands of farming households around the world."

Tony and the Oakwell Trust's induction into the College of Benefactors celebrated not only his achievements and generosity but also the lasting difference his support has made. Through the Oakwell Trust, his legacy at Reading is helping to transform lives today, while shaping a brighter future for generations to come.

### The Cyril Tyler Prize

### Honouring a legacy, empowering future research leaders

Early career researchers are at the forefront of discovery, but the transition to independent research leadership is often demanding. Building collaborations, testing bold ideas and stepping into leadership roles all require resources and support. The Cyril Tyler Prize was created in 2025 to ensure that promising researchers can take their work in new and ambitious directions.

The prize honours the late Professor Cyril Tyler, a distinguished Agricultural Chemistry academic who dedicated his entire career to Reading and served as Deputy Vice-Chancellor from 1968 to 1976. Tyler was renowned for championing younger colleagues across all disciplines, and his legacy continues through this annual award.

Each year, four prizes of £10,000 will be awarded—one in each of the University's four research themes. Crucially, the funds can be used flexibly over two years, enabling recipients to take risks,

expand networks, and strengthen their research leadership.

The inaugural prize winners, announced earlier this year, reflect the breadth and creativity of Reading's research community. Their projects range from developing a community-centred approach to dementia assessment, to applying AI in wildlife conservation, to analysing links between religious fundamentalism and authoritarianism, and even reimagining the climate crisis through epic poetry. Together, these initiatives show how innovation thrives across the sciences, social sciences, arts, and humanities alike.

The first recipients were celebrated in June at a ceremony attended by members of the Tyler family, who were formally inducted into the University's College of Benefactors—the highest honour given to donors—in recognition of Professor Tyler's enduring contribution to academic excellence.

Professor Tyler's son, Jonathon Tyler shared the following words with us in June; "I am proud of my father and delighted to be honoured by this event today. His life is a good example of how happenstance can work to create institutional and social contributions of lasting value."

Reflecting on the prize, Professor Roberta Gilchrist, Associate Pro-Vice-Chancellor Research (Heritage & Creativity), commented:

"These winning projects demonstrate exceptional quality and innovation while tackling some of the most pressing issues of our time. Professor Tyler's commitment to nurturing emerging research talent continues through this prize, and this funding will make a real difference to these talented researchers as they advance their important work."

The Cyril Tyler Prize is an investment in the next generation of researchers. By empowering early career academics to take bold steps forward, it ensures that Professor Tyler's dedication to academic excellence continues to inspire and support research leaders of the future.

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### From scholarship winner to supporter

For Lorena Goldsmith, Contracts Manager, Research and Innovation at City, St George's University of London and Founder of The Literary Studio Ltd, it was the perfect chance to explore an issue she felt was urgent and deeply relevant - how emerging technology could at once open doors and create new barriers for women aspiring to lead.

Offering a nuanced analysis of how AI can both facilitate and complicate women's pathways to leadership, Lorena received a fully funded Executive MBA Global scholarship, joining a diverse cohort on an internationally delivered programme, including study experiences in South Africa and the USA

This essay competition is a collaboration between Henley Business School, the Financial Times and the 30% Club, reflecting the shared mission of the three partner institutions to encourage gender balance in leadership teams and practical support for the development of strong female talent.

Reflecting on her achievement, Lorena said: "I view the scholarship not just as recognition, but as a profound responsibility to champion fair representation and the advancement of women throughout my career."

That sense of responsibility soon turned into action. After learning about Henley Business School's Hardship Fund, which supports students facing unexpected challenges during their studies, Lorena decided to become a donor herself.



### Roman Colchester

Colchester Museums are home to one of the most significant collections of Roman archaeology in the UK, an extraordinary assembly of artefacts that speaks to the town's rich past as Britain's first recorded city and former Roman capital. This nationally important collection has been formally recognised with Designation Status by Arts Council England.

Despite the exceptional depth and national significance of Colchester's Roman collections, much of their potential remains untapped. Many artefacts, some of the most historically important in Britain, are still underresearched and largely unknown to the wider public.

Thanks to University of Reading donors, Graham and Joanna Barker of the Ardeola Trust, this is beginning to change. Their visionary support made a major new initiative possible. Investing generously in dedicated curatorial research means the full potential of the collection can be unlocked.

"This hugely important chapter of Roman history should be within reach of as many people as possible. These objects are silent witnesses to lives lived nearly two thousand years ago. This project is about piecing together the civilisation that lies directly beneath our feet, joining the dots in history, and allowing us to see our modern world in the light of the past." Graham shared with us.

The donation is generously funding a one-year post for a Curatorial Researcher for Roman Collections at Colchester Museums, with the goal of deepening understanding and broadening public engagement with



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
these remarkable artefacts. Carolina Rangel de Lima, a researcher with a passion for Roman material culture, has been appointed to the role and will lead the project over the coming year.

This important work will improve public access to the museum's Roman collections by expanding and enriching the online content available through the Colchester Museums website, helping

virtual visitors from across the globe connect with the stories behind key artefacts. This includes a co-authored book, The 50 Most Fascinating Objects from Roman Colchester, which will showcase a selection of the most intriguing items in the collection, from everyday household goods to rare ceremonial pieces.

Alongside these public projects,
Carolina's research will explore specialist
topics including unique materials found
in Colchester's architecture. Her work will
also examine artefacts linked to religious
practices, shedding light on the spiritual
lives of Colchester's Roman residents.

Through this project, the museum's collections will become more accessible, better understood, and more widely celebrated. We are truly grateful to Graham and Joanna Barker and the Ardeola Trust for their generous support in making it possible for everyone to explore these wonderful artefacts.



### Supporting the Climate Leaders of Tomorrow

The Climate Stripes have become one of the most powerful visual symbols of our time. First created by climate scientist Professor Ed Hawkins in 2018 at the University of Reading, the stripes compress more than a century of temperature data into a single image: a sequence of vertical bars shifting from cool blues to deep reds.

Each stripe represents a year, with blue shades reflecting cooler global temperatures and red shades showing warmer years. Taken together, the graphic reveals an unmistakable trend of rapid warming, transforming complex climate data into an accessible, universal language.

They remind us that climate change is not abstract but immediate and visible. Their simplicity makes them a pivotal focal point for awareness, action, and education. In that spirit, the Climate Stripes Scholarship was established at the University in 2024,

supported entirely by generous donor contributions.

The scholarship recognises students who demonstrate academic excellence and a commitment to tackling environmental challenges. It provides financial assistance that allows recipients to pursue their studies and research with fewer financial barriers, ensuring the brightest minds can focus on solutions to the climate crisis.

Professor Ed Hawkins shared with us: "The Climate Stripes scholarship has offered students the unrivalled opportunity to study at the University of Reading, one of the world's leading centres for weather and climate. After completing their studies they are able to contribute to improving the global response to climate change and many will train others to do the same, so amplifying the effect of these scholarships."

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By linking the internationally recognised stripes with student support, the scholarship embodies the same spirit of accessibility and hope that the graphic represents. Just as the stripes turn data

into action-inspiring imagery, the scholarship transforms donor generosity into tangible opportunities for future leaders.

Fernanda was one of the first recipients of the 2024 Climate Stripes Scholarship and shared with us: "Receiving the Climate Stripes Scholarship is both an honour and a profound responsibility. It represents a belief in my potential to contribute meaningfully to climate science.
